NEW! Lee's Retreat from Gettysburg

After the battle of Gettysburg, the Confederate Army of Northern Virginia had to retreat to Virginia. This exit from Gettysburg was one of the most difficult withdrawals of the Civil War and Robert E. Lee was at his best. Lee had to hold off the Union Army of the Potomac, cross a mountain range with his extensive wagon train of wounded, and then found the Potomac River to be flooded due to heavy rains. Examine how this part of the Gettysburg Campaign was conducted by both sides and what impact these two weeks had on the rest of the war. *Instructor: Dave Booz*

NEW! Maryland Railroads in The Civil War

Discover the vital role played by Maryland's railroads during the Civil War. Enjoy exciting topics such as John Brown's Raid on Harper's Ferry; the crucial part the railroads played in the assassination plots against President-elect Lincoln; and his subsequent call for volunteers after the outbreak of hostilities. Explore Union General Butler's prompt and decisive actions to seize and occupy strategic points in Maryland via the railroads and shepherd troops into and through beleaguered Washington DC. Examine Baltimore as a railroad transshipment point for the Union forces and Stonewall Jackson's famous raid and capture of vital engines and rolling stock on the B&O. Analyze the railroad role in ole' Jubal Early's 1864 Monocacy Campaign, including the Johnson-Gilmer raids and the Lincoln Funeral Train. *Instructor: Jeff Goodson*

NEW! Peninsula Campaign of 1862

The Peninsula Campaign of 1862 was the largest military operation of the American Civil War. The combined land and sea forces of the Union and Confederacy, numbering a quarter of a million men, fought along the strip of land between the York and the James Rivers in Southeastern Virginia. The campaign encompassed a myriad of skirmishes, nine pitched battles and a siege. Study the combat and politics that shaped this famous campaign. *Instructor: Phillip Muskett*
