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Best Practices for Contacting Officials

1. **Reach out to the right person** for your issue.
 2. **Identify yourself clearly** with your name and address.
 3. **Be direct and concise**—state your concern or request clearly.
 4. **Keep it short** - emails should be one page or less.
 5. **Stay respectful and professional.**
 6. If you disagree with something, **offer a possible solution.**
 7. **Attend meetings or forums** and speak on the issue.
 8. **Follow up** within a few weeks or before a scheduled vote.
 9. **Build support** by connecting with other residents, groups, or organizations.
